## Day 3: Shifts in techniques – how are we teaching, and why?

## Reflecting key shifts in our pronunciation teaching by John Hughes

Over the last thirty years, there have been three key shifts affecting pronunciation teaching: The impact of English as a lingua franca, the demand for online teaching, and the belief that pronunciation should be integrated, rather than treated separately.
